### **Lollipop moments – finding and recognizing that ‘sweet spot’ in your student services role Cheryl Christensen (Athabasca University)**

Whether it is transitioning from secondary into post-secondary, between post-secondary institutions or credentials, or returning to post-secondary from the work force, the Transfer Alberta website offers students information to support their planning.

Student advisors will have opportunity to explore pathways that students enrolling in their post-secondary institutions may pursue. The website and tools offer an opportunity for students to assess their prospective pathway(s) both into an initial post-secondary institution and mobility opportunities beyond.

#### **Engaging with Online Learners**

This session will introduce a number of new and exciting initiatives that Bow Valley College has started to engage with our online learners. The Academic Success Centre approaches learning from a Universal Design perspective, offering tutoring supports and learning strategies to all students. One of our latest initiatives is investigating ways to target the needs of our online student populations. This session will highlight some of the tools that we have developed, including chats, web conferencing, and website resources to engage with our learners. But our session is also a chance for participants to learn from each other – sharing their experiences with online learners and best practices that have worked for their learners.

#### **The Blanket Exercise**

### **Let's Get Physical for Mental Health**

Anxiety and depression are two mental health illnesses frequently experienced by post-secondary students (American College Health Association, 2016). Research has identified the negative impact of these experiences on students. Emerging evidence suggests that physical exercise is an effective intervention in the treatment of these issues. In response to the prevalence of these two mental health illnesses, and the emerging data on the impact of physical exercise on mental health, Mount Royal University obtained funding from Alberta Blue Cross to create the "Steps to Well-being Program", an innovative exercise program for students. This presentation will focus on exercise's impact on mental health, and the MRU "Steps to Well-Being" program. We will share information about this program and get you thinking how individually and institutionally you can get physical and along the way have a positive impact on mental health.

### **You're the Peanut Butter to My Jelly: Integrating Career and Academic Advising**

### **Asokan – Building the Bridge to Reconciliation in Post-Secondary Education**

In June 2015, the Final Report of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) of Canada was released. Outlining the history of residential schools in Canada and the on-going impact felt by survivors and subsequent generations of Aboriginal peoples, the report made recommendations to facilitate the reconciliation process. Within academic institutions across Canada, there is much discussion about “indigenizing the academy” by incorporating Indigenous perspectives and histories into all levels of public education. As an advisor in a public post-secondary college, I question my role and the role of the institution in helping Aboriginal students succeed in their educational pursuits. My personal and professional goal is to build bridges and make positive and meaningful cultural connections on the road to reconciliation.

### **Mobile App Selection Tool (MAST)**

The Athabasca University Mobile App Selection Tool (MAST) is a means for student’s to discover, request to borrow and provide peers with feedback about various apps.

The MAST is constantly evolving with new apps based on student feedback for iOS and Android apps. MAST’s front end is WordPress, the back end is Cisco Meraki’s Systems Manager(Enterprise Mobile Management). Systems Manager (SM) allows administrators to monitor and control devices and app installations, push and revoke apps licenses to student iTunes accounts or device serial numbers while always retaining ownership. This presentation will demonstrate MAST and SM so you will understand this easy, app deployment method that is effective in education at a distance.

### **Everything International – A Conversation Café**

The challenge is defining what coaching is and most certainly, what it is not. Coaching supports the mastery of learning giving the recipient a strong sense of support in moving forward.
